The list below contains areas of grammar that presented problems for the majority of students in the Mock Grammar Test in Week 1. You are strongly advised to consult a grammar reference website or book and do a considerable amount of self-study, both theory and exercises, especially regarding the points below in order to consolidate these aspects of English.

1. tag questions

He hasn't got a car, has he?

They never went to the Eiffel Tower when they were in Paris, **did they**?

John is a terrible driver, isn't he?

Amy couldn't speak German before she went to live in Berlin, could she?

2. third conditionals

If I hadn't done a lot of revision, I wouldn't have passed the entrance exam.

They would have moved to Prague, if their father hadn't changed his job.

3. direct and indirect speech

"Mary, can you buy me some beer when you go to the supermarket?" asked Tom.

-> Tom asked Mary to buy him some beer when she went to the supermarket.

4. past simple and present perfect tenses

I studied in Manchester in 2014.

I have been studying in Manchester since 2014.

5. despite – although

The flight was very uncomfortable, **despite the expense**.

Although the flight was expensive, it was very uncomfortable.

6. wish – suggest – insist

I wish I hadn't bought that CD.

I **suggest you buy** a new dictionary.

Mark **insisted on** paying the bill.

7. as long as – unless

You won't pass the exam unless you study regularly.

You will pass the exam as long as you study regularly.

8. rather

Jennifer's father wants her to work in the family business, not for someone else.

-> Jennifer's father would rather she worked in the family business, not for someone else.
